Our Business Community...

The economic outloook for our borough continues to improve. The timely re-opening of the Buttonwood Street Bridge, scheduled for the end of this March, in conjunction with street paving and streetscape improvements up to Delaney Circle will serve, as what I refer to, the "Buttonwood Street Gateway" into the borough.

Continuing along Reading Avenue, which I envision to be the new "Avenue of Commerce" on the north side of the borough, it will serve as a main artery to the newly planned economic development and revitalization of the VF Outlet Complex, and the former Narrow Fabric Property.

Equus Capital Partners, LTD has acquired the VF Complex with plans to invest over seventy million dollars in the redevelopment of the VF site, and Longview Construction has already begun the transformation of the former Narrow Fabric site. The revitalization of these sites translates into new tax revenues. It is a significant economic boost for our borough for the foreseeable future.

Our Neighborhoods...

Equally important is the residential/neighborhood of our borough.

Our neighborhood revitalization program is administered by Dean L. Rohrbach, Elm Street Manager, under the auspices of the West Reading Community Revitalization Foundation (WRCRF).

Mr. Rohrbach recently successfully Photo courtesy of The Reading Eagle applied and obtained a funding grant from the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development pledging \$246,512. In public sector funds with an additional \$53,500 coming from our borough government and Reading Health System.

The two-block project along S 6th Avenue is important in transforming this older neighborhood making it more attractive, inviting, safer, and more walkable. Groundbreaking is expected to begin this Spring. Congratulations to Mr. Rohrbach and all parties involved in making West Reading a better place to live, work and play.

As your Mayor, I will continue to expend my efforts to lead and serve in the best interests of our community and look forward to your continued support. Best regards to you and yours.



As I'm sure you have heard, the Buttonwood Street Bridge re-construction is almost complete and is scheduled to be reopened by April 24th. Borough Council decided last year to budget for the repaving of Buttonwood Street, from the bridge to Delaney Circle and this work will be completed prior to the opening of the bridge. Once it is open, the detour will be lifted, signs will be removed and the lane changes on Penn Avenue that have been in place for the duration of the project will be removed. That means the center lane will revert back to a turning lane, and LEFT TURNS WILL BE ALLOWED AGAIN!

Soon after the re-opening of the Buttonwood Street Bridge, work will begin on the Penn Street Bridge. With the ramp from 422 westbound into the City of Reading being closed, there will be two official detours (as shown on the map), one that will impact West Reading.

Council Corner ... Councilmember Suzanne Thompson

Those of you who have ever attended our monthly Borough Council meetings know that they sometimes last several hours, and that, even after 2 or 3 (or more) hours plowing through the issues before Council, we periodically need to schedule yet another meeting to complete the work on our monthly agenda. You may know that we are also called upon carve out even more time from our evenings and sometimes weekends - to serve on other Council committees and commissions.

Though time consuming and often tedious, the work Council does is important - vital to the Borough. It takes not just time but perseverance and dedication to get through it all, which is why it surprises me (pleasantly) that most Council members, having completed their sworn duties on behalf of West Reading, take time to do more.

They find causes that they see as important, and then find additional time to support those endeavors - like the West Reading Crime Watch (WRCW).

Because the WRCW's membership since its inception has always included at least 3 of the altogether 7 sitting members of Borough Council, 'The Council Corner' section of this Courier issue is devoted to the WRCW.

5 years ago, Carl Garman, then a community minded citizen (and now Council President) spearheaded the resurrection of an inactive neighborhood crime prevention/patrol organization called the West Reading Watchers.

With an initial grant from the West Reading Elm Street Program as part of its own "Safe, Clean and Green" program directive and small group of residents (I was one of them), along with Council Members Nathalie Kulesa, Elizabeth Heckler and West Reading's Sergeant Keith Phillips as the group's police liaison, the West Reading Watchers re-organized and was re-named the West Reading Crime Watch (WRCW).

State initiated budget cutbacks decreased Elm Street's funding, so WRCW's first Elm Street grant turned out to be it's last, but that was not the end of the WRCW. With help from both our Police and Fire Departments as well as a generous grant from the Volunteer Firemens Beneficial Association of West Reading - the WRCW has been able to continue its mission to enhance public safety and reduce crime by creating an active, ongoing presence in the community.

The WRCW supplements police activites by providing extra "eyes and ears" on the street. In 2016, WRCW volunteers clocked more than 400 street patrol hours. WRCW members also participate on patrol at several community events: National Night Out, annual Easter Egg Hunt, Art on the Avenue, Fall Festival, Haunted House, Harvest Hayride, and Holiday Glow.



The WRCW's own event, the semi-annual Bicycle Safety and Anti-Theft initiative, will be held on Saturday, April 22 from 9AM - 12 noon, at the Playground Pavillion.

We can always use more residents to join in on the patrols and monitoring special events, but there are several other ways that almost any resident can augment the WRCW's work. Even devoting as little as 15 minutes a day while going about one's daily routine can help keep our borough safe.

Protecting our community is important work - and (dare I say it?) it is actually - and often - fun!

Join us at Borough Hall (7:00 PM on the 2nd Tuesday of each month) and get not only some simple safety tips, but also a firsthand report about current borough crime trends from our WRCW Police Liaison.






Bulk Item Collection

Water conservation

It helps the environment and yourself when taking the proper measures. Make sure your outside spigot is turned off and secured when not in use. Your kitchen sink and/or a silent leak in your toilet can waste water. Did you know that 1 drip a second can waste roughly 34 gallons of water in a month?

Sewer Backups

If you have water in your basement or see it running at the street please call borough hall first at 610-374-8273 during the hours of 8:00 AM and 5:00 PM Monday thru Friday. After hours or on the weekend/holiday please call the non-emergency police line at 610-373-0111. We recommend that you contact the borough first to avoid plumbers fees. Once we assess the issue we can tell you whether or not a plumber is needed.

***Note: Please be aware that NOTH-ING other than toilet paper is allowed to be flushed. It doesn't matter what the manufacturers instructions say they can, anything other than toilet paper will clog the sewer system. This includes: wipes; feminine products; paper towels; wash cloths;

Crime Prevention Tips and Good Neighbor Tips

Street Postings

PLEASE CHECK YOUR STREET FOR SIGN POSTINGS, including those that are posted for the street cleaning program. Borough Crew Members may also post the streets for other maintenance work. Signs are posted on posts, trees and stakes the day before the scheduled maintenance work. Vehicles must be removed during the specified times, or tickets will be issued.

Going on vacation?

We ask that all residents call the Police Department at 610-373-0111 and file a report that you are going on vacation. This information will be of assistance to us whether you will be

gone for an overnight trip or for a month. Having the information on file will be helpful if your vehicle will be parked on the street while you are gone in case your street is posted for maintenance work. It will also be helpful if we need to contact someone in the event of an emergency.

Permit and Inspection Information

A common question we receive is "Do I need a permit to have work done?" In most cases yes you do. A building permit is required for, but not limited to: Additions, Decks, Fences, Windows, Renovations, Concrete, Roof, Electrical and Plumbing work.

A *PLUMBING PERMIT* must be acquired by a master plumber, and the fees vary depending upon the type of work being done.

A **ZONING PERMIT** is required for all businesses, including home occupations within the Borough. A zoning permit is also required for all fences, accessory buildings, additions and driveways. The zoning permit fee is \$50.00.

A *RENTAL OCCUPANCY PERMIT* is required for all residential rental units and is to be acquired by the owner of the property. A bi-annual (every 2 years) inspection and annual occupancy permit fee of \$75.00 per unit is required. A tenant list-

and updated within ten (10) days of any change in occpancy as well as on an annual basis.

ing of all occupants must be completed for every rental unit

A CERTIFICATE OF OCCUPANCY INSPECTION is required prior to the sale or transfer of ANY property located within the Borough. Please visit our office or our website at www.westreadingborough.com to obtain the Certificate of Occupancy Inspection Application. This inspection should be scheduled upon obtaining an agreement of sale. The fee for this inspection is \$100.00 for a single unit; additional units are an additional \$25.00 per unit. Inspections scheduled less than five business days from settlement will be charged \$200.00.

An *ALARM PERMIT* is required for all alarmed properties within the Borough. There is a one-time permit fee of \$50.00. Please be aware that after three (3) false alarms within a calendar year a fine of \$100.00 will be issued for each and every false alarm thereafter until December 31st.

A *BURN PERMIT* is required prior to the use of any type of outdoor fireplace unit. All portable fireplace units must be located a minimum of fifteen feet from all structures in the yard area. This permit must be approved by the Fire Chief. The burn permit fee is \$25.00 annually.

A *SIGN PERMIT* is required for all new signs and/or changes to existing signs. The sign permit fee is \$100.00.

The 2017 fee schedule:

Residential Building Permits

Up to \$1,999.99..... \$30.00 plus state fee \$2000.00 or over..... 1.5% of the total costs *Plus \$4.00 state fee for each permit*

Commercial Building Permits

Cost of total job - Up to \$1,999.99..... \$30.00 \$2,000.00 to \$499,999.99..... 1.5% of total cost \$500,000.00 or over..... 75% of total cost *Plus \$4.00 state fee for each permit*

Permit and Inspection Information

A YARD/GARAGE SALE PERMIT is required to be completed prior to the sale. The first permit is free and the second is

\$5.00. Only two yard/garage sales are permitted per calendar year. This does not include any advertised West Reading Borough wide event. Signs for your yard/garage sale may only be posted on your property. Signs may not be placed on telephone or electric poles or in the planting strip area.



A SOLICITATION PERMIT is requried for any door-to-door soliciting (products, services, handing out flyers/any materials,

leaving flyers/brochures for residents or to attach door hangers, etc). Permits must be secured prior to soliciting activity. A Borough issued ID badge must be worn at all times while soliciting. If a person is soliciting and cannot provide an ID badge issued by the Codes Department please retain any contact information and call the Codes Department.

Anyone found working without proper permits shall be charged a TRIPLE permit fee.

If you are not sure whether or not you need a building permit, please call the Code Enforcement Department at 610-374-8273, ext. 238 and we will be glad to answer any questions you may have.

PA1 Call

Reminder: It is a state law that you place a dig notification prior to starting any work which involves digging. This is to ensure that underground utility lines are not damaged. The number to call is 1-800-242-1776 or 8-1-1.

There is a three day waiting period to allow the utility companies to visit your property to mark any underground gas, water, sewer, electric, and cable lines. .



Failure to place a PA1 call you will be liable for all costs incurred if any lines are damaged.

Exterior Property Inspections

The Code Department will continue to perform exterior inspections of all commercial and residential properties. Items our inspectors will be monitoring are:

- ~ Unprotected wood framework
- ~ Missing/defective rain gutters and downspouts
- ~ Broken windows and/or any structural defects
- ~ Chimneys/decks/porches/porch supports must be maintained in good repair.
- ~ Sidewalks maintained free from hazardous conditions
- ~ Front and rear address identification, etc.

Reminders

- 1) Grass and weeds shall be maintained at a height less than 10" at all times. All grass/weeds in the planting strip and along the alley are the property owner's responsibility.
- 2) Pet owners are responsible for the removal and proper disposal of animal fecal matter when it is deposited on public or private property, alleys, public streets, sidewalks, etc. Pet owners are responsible for keeping their property clean of animal fecal matter which must be removed on a daily basis or within every 24 hour period.
- 3) Animals at Large It is unlawful for any person to allow an animal to be outdoors without controlled restraint at any time.
- 4) Noise by Animals Pet owners are responsible to prevent continuous noise for a period of ten (10) minutes or intermittently for thirty (30) minutes or more that may disturb any person at any time of the day or night unless a person is trespassing or threatening to trespass upon private property or causes to tease or provoke an animal.
- 5) Cars, trucks, RV's, motorcycles, etc. cannot be parked on the grass on your property or the property where you reside. Vehicles may only be parked on a stone, concrete or macadam pad. Prior to installing any parking pad, a zoning permit application is required.
- 6) Trees, shrubs, hedges or other vegetation shall not extend into sidewalk space, streets or alleyways. Growth shall not be at a height of less than eight (8) feet over any sidewalk or pedestrian walkway or sixteen (16) feet over any roadway.
- 7.) All properties are to be clearly marked with their individual house number in the front and rear of the property. The height of the numbering is to be a minimum of four (4) inches, the color must clearly contrast with the background and be placed in an easily identifiable location.

Trash Information

Special Notice: The Code Department will continue to be placing an emphasis on the enforcement of trash/refuse bags that are not stored in durable, watertight containers with lids. Notice of violation letters will be mailed or posted on any property found to be in violation. If the violation continues, citations will be filed with the District Magistrate. We request your cooperation to ensure public health and safety.

- 1.) All refuse must be stored in durable, water-tight containers equipped with handles and tight-fitting covers which cannot be larger than thirty-five (35) gallons. It is recommended that you mark your containers with your address.
- 2.) Four (4) trash cans per residence per collection day are allowed. Please do not place bulky items out for regular collection. One bulk item per household may be placed out as of noon the day prior to bulk collection which is the *first Friday of every month*.
- 3.) Trash/recycling containers may be placed out for collection as of noon the day prior to collection and promptly removed or by midnight the day of collection. Containers may not be stored along the street/alleyway.
- 4.) Trash collection remains every Tuesday and Friday. Recycling collection remains every Wednesday.
- 5.) Yard waste must be placed in biodegradable bags for collection or arrangements made with the Borough Garage for disposal. Please contact the Public Works Department at 610-374-8605 to schedule an appointment between the hours of 7:00 AM to 4:00 PM. The Public Works building is located at 1st & Chestnut Streets.



6.) Electronic items such as microwaves, refrigerators, air conditioners, televisions, etc will not be collected by the trash/recycling hauler and must be recycled due to hazardous materials. Please contact Berks County Solid Waste Authority at 610-478-6362 or visit their website at www.co.berks.pa.us/swa for more information.

Important Skunk Information for Residents

Keep a watchful eye...

Skunks, by nature, are nocturnal animals who usually forage for food in the cover of darkness. If you see a skunk during daylight hours, this could be a sign that the skunk is rabid. Signs of rabid skunk behavior include the following:

- 1.) A skunk that is aggressive and shows no fear of humans or dogs may be a carrier. If a skunk keeps coming at you without fear, it is a very common sign that the skunk is rabid. Under normal circumstances, a skunk should be afraid of humans.
- 2.) If the skunk is drooling excessively or foaming at the mouth, it could possibly be a sign.
- 3.) Sometimes a rabid animal will attack inaminate objects. It will be completely confused and aggressive
- 4.) Does the skunk look drunk? Is it walking funny, stumbling, and stagger-

ing? This may be a sign of a rabid animal.

5. On some occassions, but certainly not every occassion, a skunk will experience hind leg paralysis.

Please keep in mind that a skunk's favorite food is dog and cat food as well as trash and scraps left in the yard. Be sure to bring in all dishes of dog or cat food at night, secure your trash cans and remove any food scraps from your yard.

Remedy for Odor Removal

If you have the unfortunate luck to have your pet sprayed by a skunk there are numerous remedies available which can be researched online to deodorize your animal and home.

One method which works and has been tested is:

- ~ 1 qt of hydrogen peroxide
- ~ 1/4 cup baking soda
- ~ 1 to 2 teaspoons for liquid dish soap

Mix ingredients in an open container and use it immediately. Do not store remaining ingredients as the container can explode. Avoid splashing the product in the eyes or mouth. Allow the solution to remain for five minutes before rinsing with water. Repeat as needed.

Fire Safety

If you use a gas grill please make sure the grill is connected properly and that you don't have any gas leaks before you turn it on. Even if you have a small leak, it could cause a fire with dangerous consequences. Also remember to keep your grill away from your home or any other combustible structures. An important thing to remember is to use any gas-burning grill outside, not inside your home. These grills produce carbon monoxide, which is colorless and odorless and can kill you. If you have any questions about your gas grill, please give us a call.

Remember to periodically check your smoke detectors. A dead battery in your smoke detector will not help you in a fire emergency. Many of the homes we visit on fire calls do not have operating smoke detectors, or they have none at all. Smoke detectors are a cheap way to make your family safe, so please make sure they are in working order. We have smoke detectors available for sale at our station for \$10.00. We will also install them in your home for you at no charge. We also install owner provided smoke detector batteries for you at no charge if you are unable to do it yourself. Contact the station for more details.

Open Burning

Please be advised that open burning is illegal in the Borough unless you apply for and receive a permit from the Codes Department. This means no open burning of leaves, yard waste or any type of outdoor temporary fireplace without prior authorization from the fire department. Please have consideration for your neighbors and refrain from burning anything in your yards this spring. If you have any questions please contact the Borough's Code Enforcement Department.

Fire Extinguishers

We get calls at the station from residents all the time about fire extinguishers...what kind do I need for my home?? What can be done with our old extinguishers?? We would love to help you!



We do not sell fire extinguishers here at the West Reading Fire Department, but we would recommend that you visit any home improvement store or fire extinguisher vendor and look closely at the packaging to make sure you purchase an extinguisher that will work with the hazards you have in your home. Selecting the wrong fire extinguisher for the fire hazard can be very dangerous.

As far as old extinguishers or used units, if you don't feel comfortable throwing them away in the trash please bring them to the station any Wednesday night at 6:00 PM and we will dispose them for you. If you have any questions, please give us a call.

Carbon Monoxide Detectors

We have received reports from some residents that they have had Carbon Monoxide detectors activating in their homes, and they were unsure of what they should do. Carbon Monoxide (CO) is an invisible, odorless gas that comes from burning fossil fuels such as gasoline, wood, coal, propane, oil, and methane. When these fuels burn incompletely, CO is produced. If a CO detector activates, we can check your home with meters that we carry on our apparatus that can detect the presence of CO and we can validate the reasons for the detector's activation. If this activation is not checked, you could be placing all of the occupants of your home in danger. If your detector activates, call 911 immediately and evacuate your home and await our arrival. If you have any questions about CO or CO detectors, please call the station.

SOUTH 6TH AVENUE PROJECT

Our grant application that was submitted to the Pennsylvania Dept of Community and Economic Development (DCED) for \$246,512 for a \$300,000 streetscape improvement project has been approved for the west side of South 6th Avenue between Cherry Street and Wayne. The project will include new sidewalks and curbs; installation of decorative curvilinear brick-lined grass medians with street trees; and new handicap accessible ramps which meet current federal regulations.

This project will create an attractive gateway from West Reading's business district to the clock tower at the Reading Hospital. It will also be another element of showing off West Reading's older neighborhoods as unique and distinctive to give us a competitive advantage with other suburban locations.

The bid package and site plan have been completed and we should be able to proceed with this project ASAP. Our goal is to break ground in the spring and have the project completed by year's end.

2016 YEAR-END FUNDRAISING & VOLUNTEER LABOR

In addition to the \$246,512 DCED grant mentioned above, the Elm Street Manager raised \$155,000 from other corporate and foundation private sector sources bringing the **total amount of funds raised to \$401,512.**

In 2016, the Elm Street Program recruited 189 volunteers who donated 741 hours of labor worth a total of \$15,696 for projects like 'Let's Paint the Town' and 'Earth Day Clean-Up'.



CHERRY STREET MURAL CORRIDOR

There are a total of thirteen murals and mosaics in the three block radius between South 4th and South 8th Avenues with four new works planned for 2017. The six completed in 2016 are:



- 1. "Maiden of the Stairs" mosaic (4th & Cherry)
- 2. Gas Pump Mural (West Reading Tavern)
- 3. Corridor Sign Mosaic (6th & Cherry)
- 4. Minerva (Edwards Business Systems)
- 5. Today is a Bright Night (Waldman Electric)
- 6. Golden Ration of Timelessness (Gehris Tile)

We also conducted two tours of the Cherry Street Murual Corridor. Both were well attended and we continue to get positive press, radio and TV media coverage showing West Reading has vitality, style and

is interesting. Public art communicates to visitors and tells them that something special is going on here.

PROPERTY ACQUISITION, REHABILITATION & RESELL (PARR) PROGRAM

Through PARR, Elm Street buys foreclosed properties to keep them from falling into the hands of investors. We then repair and modernize the properties before selling them only to a homeowner. The affect has been to raise property values in the surrounding neighborhood. In 2016, two PARR projects were completed: 138 S 6th Avenue and 115 S 2nd Avenue.


