The Borough has adopted codes that govern the use and maintenance of private property, such as weed abatement, rubbish and graffiti in order to enhance and protect the quality of life for all who work, live and play in the Borough.

Be a Good Neighbor...Take Pride in Your Borough

What does it mean to be a "good neighbor" and how does that lead to taking pride in our community? Each one of us might interpret that to mean something different. Still, it might be worth considering what being a "good neighbor" and a prideful resident means in your neighborhood, from lifelong to new residents, people of all ages, and from all walks of life. With so much diversity, how can we work and live happily among each other?

Perhaps the first, and easiest way to being a "good neighbor" is to introduce yourself to anyone on your block and particularly those who share a property line with you. This simple act breaks down barriers and creates open dialogue of a respectful nature. Knowing the people who live around you provides a strengthened sense of pride in your home and neighborhood.

Next, take care of your property. This doesn't have to mean that we all must have properties that are featured in the pages of magazines, but when living in a community there are reasonably courteous behaviors expected for the benefit of all. The following provides some examples:

- Walk your dog on a leash and be sure to carry plastic bags to clean up afterwards.
- Put your garbage cans out the night before pick up and put them away as soon as possible. Do not leave your garbage cans out – nobody wants to see your garbage every day of the week.
- Clean your front sidewalks, including weeds in the gutter it really isn't anybody else's responsibility. Take the lead and think of the curb appeal for all. This includes mowing and weeding your property regularly throughout the summer, and expedited snow removal in the winter.
- Be mindful of your noise levels, particularly late in the evening and early in the morning.
- Be aware of your elderly neighbors, particularly in weather extremes. A friendly check in is the neighborly thing to do.
- "See Something Say Something" If you see something that looks suspicious, please report it...allow the police to determine what must be done, you don't know who you might help from this act.

Burn Permits

Did you know that a burn permit is needed prior to using any type of chimenea or outdoor fireplace unit? All portable fireplace units must be located a minimum of 25' from all structures in the yard area. This permit application must be approved by the Fire Chief or Fire Marshal and is renewable on an annual basis.



Reminders


1) Grass and weeds must be maintained at a height of less than 10" at all times. All grass/

weeds in the planting strip and along the alley are the property owner's responsibility.

2) Trees, shrubs, hedges or other vegetation must not extend into the sidewalk space, streets or alleyways. Growth shall not be at a height of less than 8' over any sidewalk or pedestrian walkway or 16' over any roadway. Please do not throw weeds, grass clippings and/or hedge clippings into the street.

Did you Know that in West Reading:

- No more than 3 domestic animals (cats or dogs) are allowed per residential housing unit.
- It is unlawful to permit any animal (including cats) to be at large in a public area without a controlled restraint.
- A recent change to the Borough's Animal Ordinance prohibits the tethering of an unattended dog.
- Allowing a dog to bark continuously for a period of 10 minutes or intermittently for 30 minutes or more is prohibited.
- You must pick up after your animal, both in public and on private property and dispose of the waste in a sanitary manner.

- And, in an emergency, please do not hesitate to dial 911. If the Police Department is closed, no parking signs may be purchased, and parking ticket payments may be made at the Administration Office at the West Reading Borough Hall building.

Street Postings

• Please check your street for sign postings, including those that are posted for the street cleaning program. Borough Crew Members may also post streets for other maintenance work. Signs are posted on posts, trees and stakes the day before scheduled maintenance work. Vehicles must be removed during the specified times, or tickets will be issued. Signs will be removed when the work has been completed

Going on Vacation?

- We ask that you notify the Police Department by filing a vacation report to notify us that you will be away. This information will be of assistance whether you will be gone for an overnight trip or for a month. Having the information on file will be helpful if your vehicle will be parked on the street while you are gone in case your street is posted for maintenance work. It will also be helpful if we need to contact someone in the event of an emergency.

Fire Safety

Please remember that with warm weather on the way, outdoor cooking on grills is right around the corner. Please make sure that if you use a gas grill you confirm that it is correctly connected and that you don't have any gas leaks before you turn it on. If you have even a small leak, it could cause a fire with dangerous

consequences. Also remember to keep your grill away from your home or any other combustible structures. Also, an important thing to remember is to use any gas-burning grill outside, not inside your home. These grills produce carbon monoxide, which is colorless and odorless and can kill you. If you have any questions about using your gas grill, please give us a call.

Also remember to periodically check your smoke detectors, because a dead battery in your smoke detector will not help you in a fire emergency. Many of the homes that we visit on fire calls do not have operating smoke detectors, or they have none at all. Smoke detectors are a cheap way to keep your family safe, so please make sure they are in working order. We have smoke detectors available for sale at our station at a cost of \$10 each and we can also install them in your home at no charge to you. We will also install owner provided smoke detector batteries for you at no charge if you are unable to do it yourself. Please give us a call for more information.

Open Burning

Please be advised that open burning is illegal in the Borough of West Reading unless you apply for and receive a permit from the Codes Office. This means no open burning of leaves or other yard waste, or any type of outdoor temporary fireplace

without prior authorization from the fire department. Please have consideration for your neighbors and refrain from burning anything in your yards this spring. If you have any questions, please contact the Borough's Code Enforcement Department.

Fire Extinguishers

We get calls at the station from residents all the time about fire extinguishers.... what kind do I need for my home?? What can be done with old or used fire extinguishers?? We would love to help you!

We do not sell fire extinguishers here at the WRFD, but we would recommend that you visit any home improvement store or fire extinguisher vendor and look closely at the packaging to make sure you purchase an extinguisher that will work with the hazards you have in your home. Selecting the wrong fire extinguisher for the fire hazard can be very dangerous.

As far as old extinguishers or used units, if you don't feel comfortable throwing them away in the trash, please bring them to the station any Wednesday night at 6:00 p.m. and we will dispose of them for you. Any questions please give us a call.

Street Cleaning

Street sweeping keeps roads safe by removing debris that clog storm drains and reduces the number of pollutants that collect on Borough streets. Be mindful of street sweeping signs that are posted on the street where you park. There are a few additional streets that may be added to the street sweeping program, so be on the lookout for additional signage. To remind yourself of the street cleaning schedule place a reminder in your smart phone calendar to make sure to remove your vehicle at the appropriate time to avoid a parking ticket.

If a scheduled street cleaning day falls on a holiday, unless otherwise specified, that street would not be cleaned until the next scheduled cleaning day.

Why should I care about stormwater?

Does stormwater really affect me? Whether you live in a town, the country, a city, or the suburbs, when it rains, the water that runs off needs somewhere to go. Stormwater affects everyone!

Pennsylvania abounds in natural beauty, its landscape entwined with over 83,000 miles of streams and more than 3,900 lakes, reservoirs, and ponds. Water is the lifeblood of the Commonwealth, supporting

vast forests, abundant fish and wildlife, and a wide array of human uses that draw more than four billion gallons of ground and surface water per day. This wealth of water is a blessing, but population growth has radically altered the natural systems that



manage rainfall through transpiration, infiltration, and gradual runoff into surface waters – leading to everything from poor water quality to flooding, severe erosion, and droughts.

When the amount of rain falling exceeds the land's ability to absorb it, the result is stormwater runoff. The volume of runoff and rate at which it flows varies with the intensity and duration of the rainfall – and with the type of land surface upon which it falls. A short light rain falling on permeable soils might produce little to no runoff, while heavy rain landing on an impervious parking lot can produce a substantial amount.

Without treatment, most of the stormwater that runs from the land into our waterways is unhealthy for people and bad for the environment. Runoff can carry chemicals, metals, bacteria, viruses, organic compounds, and other pollutants directly into creeks, lakes, rivers, and streams. And, stormwater runoff can cause severe erosion and flooding – even during a typical Pennsylvania storm.

Acknowledging the problems stormwater can create has forced us to take its management more seriously than ever before. We're working to preserve natural cycles and find innovative ways to mimic the environmental functions that existed before we disturbed landscapes with buildings, parking lots, and roads.

The solution lies in comprehensive stormwater management, which offers tremendous rewards to local economies, the environment, and quality of life.

Making changes to how stormwater is managed can go a long way to reduce negative impacts. Even small actions by individual homeowners like using a rain barrel, choosing permeable landscaping surfaces, or installing a rain garden can make a difference. Stormwater affects everyone!

Sewer Backups

Backups can be caused by a multitude of problems such as grease build up, tree roots, feminine products, towels/wipes, toys, etc. Therefore, we want to remind all residents and businesses to avoid flushing anything other than toilet paper.

At any time, day or night when a sewer backup occurs at your home or business your first call should be to the Borough. As part of your sewer maintenance fee, the Public Works Department will plunge the sewer trap located near your home/business in an effort to remove the clog, possibly saving you the expense of hiring a plumber. If the clog is located between your home and the curb line, we will notify you of the need for plumbing services. The Borough maintains the sewer system from the curb to the main.

To report a sewer backup during normal business hours (Monday – Friday 8am – 5pm) contact Borough Hall at 610-374-8273; outside of normal business hours contact the non-emergency Police line at 610-373-0111 to dispatch a member of the Public Works Department to your location.

Go Green Program

Did you know that your yard waste can be disposed of at the Borough Garage?

Yard waste may be disposed of between the hours of 7:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday by appointment at the Borough Garage,

please call 610-374-8605 to schedule an appointment: **Or** Yard waste may be disposed of on the first Saturday of the month without an appointment from 9:00 a.m. to Noon during the months of April through November.



The following types of yard waste will be accepted:

- · Grass clippings
- Hedge clippings
- Leaves
- Tree branches (cut 4' or shorter and no thicker than 4" in diameter)
- Garden waste

The Borough Garage is located at South 1st Avenue and Chestnut Street. The program is open to West Reading residents only, proof of residency is required. No contractors are permitted at the drop off site. We reserve the right to refuse large quantities or unsuitable materials. The yard waste will be transported to an area facility and converted into mulch to keep yard waste out of the landfill.

TIPS FOR CONSERVING WATER

Next to air, water is the most important element for the preservation of life. Water conservation can go a long way to alleviate impending shortages.

Bathrooms:

- · Never use your toilet as a waste basket.
- Do not let the water run while shaving or brushing teeth.
- Take short showers instead of tub baths. Turn off the water flow while soaping or shampooing.
- If you must use a tub, close the drain before turning on the water and fill the tub only half full. Bathe small children together.
- Never pour water down the drain when there may be another use for it, such as watering a plant or garden.

Kitchen & Laundry:

- Keep drinking water in the refrigerator instead of letting the faucet run until the water is cool.
- Wash fruits and vegetables in a basin. Use a vegetable brush.
- Do not use water to defrost frozen foods, thaw in the refrigerator overnight.
- Use a dishpan for washing and rinsing dishes.
- Scrape, rather than rinse dishes before loading into the dishwasher.
- Add food wastes to your compost pile instead of using the garbage disposal.
- · Operate the dishwasher only when completely full.
- Use the appropriate water level or load size selection on the washing machine.

Outside:

- Sweep driveways, sidewalks and steps rather than hosing off.
- Wash the car with water from a bucket, or consider using a commercial car wash that recycles water.
- When using a hose, control the flow with an automatic shutoff nozzle
- Avoid purchasing recreational water toys that require a constant stream of water.

- If you have a swimming pool, consider a new water-saving pool filter.
- Lower pool water level to reduce the amount of water splashed out.
- Use a pool cover to reduce evaporation when pool is not being used.
- Water the lawn or garden during the coolest part of the day (early morning is best). Do not water on windy days.
- Plant native plants in your landscape, they require less care and water than ornamental varieties.
- Use mulch around shrubs and garden plants to reduce evaporation from the soil surface and cut down on weed growth.
- Raise your lawn mower cutting height. Longer grass blades help shade each other, cut down on evaporation, and inhibit weed growth.

Equipment:

- Repair all leaks. A leaky toilet can waste 200 gallons per day.
 To detect leaks in the toilet, add food coloring to the tank water. If the colored water appears in the bowl, the toilet is leaking.
- Install ultra-low flow toilets, or place a plastic container filled with water or gravel in the tank of your conventional toilet. Be sure it does not interfere with operation of the toilet's flush mechanism.
- Install low-flow aerators and showerheads.
- Consider purchasing a high efficiency washing machine which can save over 50% in water and energy use.



Recreation Department - Director Christine Boud



The mission of the West Reading Recreation Commission is to provide excellence in the delivery of programs, events and services. The Borough's 23-acre park is for the use of West Reading residents and their guests. The Park facilities includes a stone pavilion, walking trails, pickleball and basketball courts, baseball and softball fields, a gravel track, volleyball court, community swimming pool and a disc golf course with a double tee pad to make it an 18-hole course.

Facility Rentals

The Bicentennial House was introduced back in 1976 by Elta K. Bitz. The Bicentennial House is available for small parties, gatherings, meetings and special events. The building

has a large gathering room with a full kitchen and handicapped accessible restrooms. There is also green landscape for outdoor entertainment.

The Pavilion was built in 1939 by Wyomissing Industries, who helped provide funds for the stone field house. This recreation facility also has a tot-lot, playground and outdoor exercise area. The Pavilion is available for gatherings and small parties.

Reservations are accepted on a first-come, first-serve basis. Information pertaining to rental fees for residents and non-residents for both facilities can be found on our website www.westreadingborough.com


Household Hazardous Waste Disposal



Are you looking for work, need your high school equivalency diploma, or simply need assistance developing your career plan? The Young Adult Program at the PA CareerLink® of Berks County assists 17–24-year-olds living in Berks County with exploring their career and educational paths through counseling, paid work experience, high school equivalency classes, professional development and more! Participants in need of their diploma can enroll in our High School Equivalency Program to obtain their diploma in around 2-4 months, with classes held every weekday. All costs are covered by the program and interested students can also participate in paid work to earn money while attending classes. Participants who have their diploma and are interested in paid work (internships) can earn between \$11-12 an hour working up to 30 hours a week at a variety of worksites. All enrolled participants work with a case manager to develop an in-depth career plan, which includes resume building, financial literacy, and learning valuable job skills. 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
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
