
Water Conservation Tips for Residents

The Facts on Leaks:

- · Common types of leaks found in the home include worn toilet flappers, dripping faucets, and other leaking valves. These are all are easily correctable.
- · Fixing easily corrected household water leaks can save homeowners about 10 percent on their water bills.
- Keep your home leak-free by repairing dripping faucets, toilet flappers, and showerheads. In most cases, fixture replacement parts don't require a major investment.

Most common leaks can be eliminated after retrofitting household with new WaterSense labeled fixtures and other high-efficiency appliances.

• Leak Detection:



One way to find out if you have a toilet leak is to place a drop of food coloring in the toilet tank. If the color shows up in the bowl within 15 minutes without flushing, you have a leak. Make sure to flush immediately after this experiment to avoid staining the tank.

Faucets and Showerheads:

- A leaky faucet that drips at the rate of one drip per second can waste more than 3,000 gallons per year. That's the amount of water needed to take more than 180 showers.
- Leaky faucets can be fixed by checking faucet washers and gaskets for wear and replacing them if necessary. If you are replacing a faucet, look for the WaterSense label.
- · Most leaky showerheads can be fixed by ensuring a tight connection using pipe tape and a wrench. If you are replacing a showerhead, look for one that has earned the WaterSense label.

Toilets:

- If your toilet is leaking, the cause is often an old faulty toilet flapper. Over time this inexpensive rubber part decays, or minerals build up on it. It's usually best to replace the whole rubber flapper – a relatively easy, inexpensive do-it-yourself project that pays for itself in no time.
- · If you do need to replace the entire toilet, look for a WaterSense labeled model. If the average family replaces its older inefficient toilets with new WaterSense labeled ones, it could save 13,000 gallons per year. Retrofitting the house could save the family nearly \$2,400 in water and wastewater bills over a lifetime.

Household hazardous waste is any household product that is labeled: caution, danger, flammable, explosive, toxic, warning, corrosive, poison, volatile or any combination of these characteristics. Placing these items in the trash or down the drain contributes to the pollution of our air and drinking waters.

Keeping West Reading Moving and Open for Business

The Public Works Department provides the daily direction, planning, coordination and supervision of numerous essential public services. Services include street cleaning, snow and ice control, removal of storm debris, storm drain maintenance, street sign maintenance, street construction and maintenance, pool and park system maintenance, leaf removal and water meter maintenance and repairs. All of these services are completed with a crew of nine.

Go Green Program

Did you know that your yard waste can be disposed of at the Borough Garage?

We currently accept grass and hedge clippings, leaves, tree branches and garden waste. Yard waste can be bundled or placed in biodegradable bags. Plastic bags will not be accepted. The Borough Garage is located at 1st & Chestnut Streets. We ask that you please call 610-374-8605 to schedule an appointment between the hours of 7:00 AM to 4:00 PM Monday through Friday.

Leaf Collection

The street cleaning program has been a great success! Street cleaning days will continue to be used for leaf collection. Please be sure to have your leaves raked out onto the street closest to the curb. Branches and other heavy debris should be separated from the leaves by placing these types of materials in the planting strip. Branches and large debris will be collected at random times. Please remember to remove your car from a street that is posted for street sweeping to avoid a parking ticket.

Reducing Stormwater and Flooding



The recent heavy rain events have made us all aware of what can happen when repeated rainstorms and intense showers occur: runoff, overflowing of streams, erosion, property damage, power outages, hazardous traveling conditions, and flooding. We can't turn the rain on and off as we see fit and the damaging storms can never be fully tamed to our desires. We can, however, remain aware of the influence we have on the environment when we build, farm and reshape the land and streams to meet society's wants and needs.

Rainfall happens and with it comes the inevitable runoff and damaging impacts. What we as a society do to address the influences we have on our environment will have far reaching implications on the health, safety

and welfare of future generations as well as on us here and now.

Here are a few suggestions about what you can do to help make a difference.

- Disconnect your rain gutters from impervious surfaces (such as driveways and sidewalks) and direct the flow to grassed areas or into infiltration beds (dry wells).
- Install a rain barrel and use the collected rainwater for watering flowers and gardens.
- Allow a buffer of native grasses and other vegetation to grow along streams, ponds, or wetlands. This will help filter pollutants, protect the stream channel and bank from erosion, and provide a better habitat for aquatic based animals.
- Convert small low-lying areas into rain gardens. These can consist of small gardens of water tolerant plants and bushes that will help retain and infiltrate runoff.
- One of the best ways you can reduce the impacts of stormwater is to reduce the pollutants that can be carried in runoff into streams, reservoirs and water supply intakes. Always properly dispose of household hazardous waste including cleaning solutions, paints, oils, batteries, solvents, pesticides, sealants, fertilizers, etc. When applying fertilizers or pesticides to your lawn or garden, only apply the recommended amount, and do not apply just before a rainstorm, or near a water body.

Keep a Clear Path to Your Water Meter

Make sure there is a clear path to the remote device for your water meter. Keeping a path clear of lawn furniture, toys, hoses, shrubbery, snow and/or ice, etc. will ensure our road crew personnel can get to your reading device to obtain consistent meter readings.

Sewer Backup

As always, avoid flushing anything other than toilet paper. This means no feminine products/wipes, paper towels, wash cloths, toys, etc. At any time, day or night when a sewer backup occurs at your home or business your first call should be to the Borough. A Public Works Member will plunge the sewer trap located near your home/business in an effort to remove the clog, possibly removing the need to hire a plumber. During normal business hours contact Borough Hall at 610-374-8273 and outside of normal business hours contact the non-emergency Police line at 610-373-0111. A member of the Public Works Department will be dispatched to your location to assess the situation. The Borough maintains the sewer system from the curb to the main. Sewer lines from the house to the curb are the property owner's responsibility.

Light Poles

Please report Borough streetlight issues to Borough Hall. Providing the location, address and pole number of the light will help field personnel to make the necessary repairs. If you discover a downed streetlight pole, exposed electrical wires or any other hazardous situation please contact the Police Department at 610-373-0111. To report a streetlight that is either on during the day or not on at night, please contact Borough Hall at 610-374-8273 or you may submit a trouble ticket directly to Met-Ed through their online Report a Lighting Problem portal.

Snow Storm Tips

Snow will be here before we know it! Please prepare your home and family in the event of a large accumulation by keeping emergency lighting on hand including fresh batteries. Also, know where your water and sewer stacks are to keep them accessible in case of an emergency or backup.

- · Check your outside lights and change bulbs as needed.
- Trim bushes and/or trees that may prevent officers on patrol from having a good view of the front of your home.
- Anyone soliciting must have a permit. Permits can be verified by calling the Code Department, or checking the Borough website.
- Check batteries in smoke and Co2 detection equipment.

Please report any suspicious activity. When calling you will be asked some or all of the following questions:

- Description of the activity.
- Description of those involved Clothing, Height, Weight, etc.... Are any weapons involved?
- Vehicles Involved Description and direction of travel if moving.

More specific information may be asked, based on the incident and what you are able to see.

Sidewalk Snow and Ice Removal

Thank you for shoveling your sidewalk, it's the neighborly thing to do! West Reading is a vibrant, walkable community, which is why it is vitally important to maintain public sidewalks and walkways in a manner safe for travel.

We do not issue notices/warnings for snow and ice removal from public sidewalks on your property.

Every owner, tenant, occupant, lessee, property agent or any other person responsible for property within the Borough must remove a clear path of at least 36" from public sidewalks within 36 hours following the end of a snow/ice event. In order to accommodate increased pedestrian traffic on Penn Avenue, a path of at least 48" shall be cleared within 24 hours following the end of a snow/ice event. All sidewalks must be maintained free of snow/ice by placing salt, sand or other abrasive or chemical material upon areas where melting and refreezing has occurred to render sidewalks safe for travel. If snow/ice is not removed within the time frame allowed, a fine for each offense will be assessed until the violation is corrected: Fine 1 - \$25; Fine 2 - \$50; Fine 3 and subsequent instances \$100 each.

Also, please be sure to clear snow away from fire hydrants as this will assist fire department personnel to extinguish a fire in the event of an emergency.

As always, the Borough seeks volunteers to assist our elderly and/or disabled residents who cannot maintain their sidewalks in the event of snow or ice. Please contact our office if you are interested in volunteering. On the same note, if you cannot maintain your sidewalk or know a resident that is elderly/disabled and in need of assistance, please contact our office to be added to a list so we may offer assistance.

One never knows when you'll need a little neighborly assistance. Unfortunately, less than half of Americans actually know the people in their communities, a fact that becomes all that more acute when it comes to needing cups of sugar or dealing with snowstorm aftermath. Make an effort to get to know your neighbor and assist each other in staying safe.

Reminders

- Trash collection is every Tuesday and Friday; recycling collection is every Wednesday.
- 2) Four (4) trash cans per household per trash collection day are allowed. Please do not place bulky items out for regular trash collection. One bulk item per household per month may be placed out for collection on the first Friday of every month.

- Please remember to store all trash within durable, water-tight containers equipped with handles and tight-fitting covers to deter the attraction of rodents to your neighborhood. It is also recommended to mark your containers and lids with your address.
- 3) Please do not place trash/recycling out prior to noon the day before collection and promptly remove your receptacle(s) by midnight the day of collection.
- 4) Electronic items such as washers, dryers, televisions, microwaves, refrigerators and air conditioners will not be removed by the trash/recycle hauler. These items must be recycled due to hazardous materials. Please contact Berks County Solid Waste Authority at 610-478-6362 or visit their website at www.co.berks.pa.us/swa for more information.
- 5) Pet waste management is an important responsibility of dog ownership. The first step is picking up what your pet leaves behind. The second is making sure it is disposed of properly. A common misconception surrounding pet waste disposal is that Fido or Fluffy's waste serves as a natural fertilizer. Dog owners take note: this is not true. In fact, leaving pet waste on the ground or concentrating it in one specific area of the yard can seriously harm soil quality and can be dangerous for both
 - families and their pets. Pet waste should always be picked up and removed from your property on a regular basis. It is recommended to scoop waste into a trash bag, then double-wrap with another bag and place in the garbage to be collected and taken to the landfill.



- 6) Cars, trucks, RV's, motorcycles, trailers, etc. cannot be parked on the grass on your property or the property where you reside. Vehicles may only be parked on a stone, concrete or macadam pad. Prior to installing a parking pad, a zoning permit application is required.
- 7) In an effort to allow emergency personnel to quickly identify your home, the Borough requires all properties to be clearly marked in the front and rear of the property. The numbers should contrast with the background and be a minimum height of four inches.
- 8) No soliciting without a permit Going door-to-door for the purpose of soliciting, handing out flyers and door hangers, etc. requires first obtaining a Borough permit. After a background check and receipt of a permit fee a Borough issued ID badge must be worn at all times while soliciting. Hours available to solicit are from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Saturday only. If a solicitor comes to your door without a Borough issued ID do not hesitate to contact the West Reading Police at 610-373-0111 to make a report. Please provide as much detail about the solicitor as possible. If you receive a brochure or letter from the solicitor, please mark the date received and turn it into the Borough for processing.

Rental Property



Regulating the condition and operation of rental housing is a major challenge facing local governments across the United States. While a stock of sound, well-managed single-family rental properties can be a valuable community asset and most landlords are responsible owners that is not always the case.

The responsibility for making sure that landlords maintain and manage their properties well falls to local governments,

which has the authority to enforce codes and take a variety of other actions under the legal powers' municipalities are granted to regulate property. The goal of these regulations is to ensure to the extent possible that landlords who own property in the municipality are responsible stewards of their properties, working with the municipality to ensure that neighborhoods remain safe and clean.

Safety inspections improve and maintain the quality of West Reading's rental properties. The inspections help educate property owners and renters about our safety requirements, encourage proper maintenance for safety, and increase communication between rental property owners, their tenants, and West Reading Borough.

Rental Property Safety Inspection Criteria

When a Borough inspector comes into your living area to perform a safety inspection, they look for the following:

Exterior:

- Legible and visible address numbers on the front and rear of the property and proper unit identification.
- Foundations and walkways appear to be in functional condition and walkways are clear from obstruction.
- Exterior walls are free of major cracks; appear weather tight.
- Exterior stairs, guardrails, landings, decks, balconies, treads, risers, and balusters are in good condition and free from visible structural defects and deterioration.
- Chimneys are in good condition and free of visible defects.
- Exterior doors open and shut properly, have a locking mechanism and glazing intact.
- Sanitation exterior property is free of debris and no visible signs of rodent infestation.
- Swimming pool water appears clean and clear. Pool gates and enclosures are in-place.
- Windows can be opened, have a locking device, and window panes intact.
- Window screens, if installed, are in good condition.

Interior:

- Interior stairs, guardrails, landings, treads, risers, and balusters are in good condition and free from visible structural defects and deterioration.
- Sanitation interior is free of debris and visible signs of rodent infestation.
- Electrical power to the rental unit, outlets and switch covers are in place, overhead lighting is operable and secure; no exposed, sliced, or bare wires.

- GFCI's in the kitchen, bathroom, laundry, unfinished basement, garage and outdoor receptacle areas.
- Receptacles two provided in each habitable space, one in the bathroom, one in the laundry room.
- Light(s) are operable in public halls, interior stairs, toilet room, kitchen, bathroom, laundry room and furnace room.
- Smoke alarms are working and installed on the ceiling or wall outside of bedroom(s), in each bedroom, on each story, and in common hallways.
- · Carbon monoxide detectors are installed at every level.
- · Fire extinguisher.
- Heat is provided to the unit, but not solely by portable units.
- Bathroom(s) contain a bathtub or shower, lavatory, toilet and are provided with hot and cold water.
- Kitchen contains cooking appliance, refrigeration and sink with hot and cold water.
- Sanitary sewer connection is provided to every sewage generating fixture.
- Roof there is no visible evidence of leaks to the interior of the structure and visible holes in the roofing materials.
- Egress shall provide a safe, continuous and unobstructed path of travel from the building to a public way.

If a safety inspection fails, the item or items must be repaired to meet the inspection requirements. A reinspection will be required.

"A rental inspection lets you, as a renter, know that the rental space you are moving into is safe for you and your family to reside."

Their job is to make sure the structure is safe and up to code. It protects you as well as the landlord. As an individual, it is your responsibility to protect your family. Having your place up to code does that."

"The officials that are in your town or city are there with the purpose to protect the residents. Talk to them. They are more than willing to assist and point you in the right direction. No, they cannot give legal advice, but they can advise you on where to find the information."



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


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


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
