Blight and nuisances can devalue, detract and degrade the quality of any neighborhood. The Borough has adopted codes that govern the use and maintenance of private property, such as weed abatement, rubbish and graffiti in order to enhance and protect the quality of life for all who work, live and play in the Borough.

Sidewalk Snow and Ice Removal

Thank you for shoveling your sidewalk, it's the neighborly thing to do! West Reading is a vibrant, walkable community, which is why it is vitally important to maintain public sidewalks and walkways in a manner safe for travel.

We do not issue notices/warnings for snow and ice removal from public sidewalks on your property.



Every owner, tenant, occupant, lessee, property agent or any other person responsible for property within the Borough must remove a clear path of at least 36" from public sidewalks within 36 hours following the end of a snow/

ice event. In order to accommodate increased pedestrian traffic on Penn Avenue, a path of at least 48" shall be cleared within 24 hours following the end of a snow/ice event. All sidewalks must be maintained free of snow/ice by placing salt, sand or other abrasive or chemical material upon areas where melting and refreezing has occurred to render sidewalks safe for travel. If snow/ice is not removed within the time frame allowed, a fine for each offense will be assessed until the violation is corrected: Fine 1 - \$25; Fine 2 - \$50; Fine 3 and subsequent instances \$100 each.

Also, please be sure to clear snow away from fire hydrants as this will assist fire department personnel

to extinguish a fire in the event of an emergency.

As always, the Borough seeks volunteers to assist our elderly and/or disabled residents who cannot maintain their sidewalks in the event of snow or ice. Please contact our office if you are interested in volunteering. On the same note, if you cannot maintain your sidewalk or know a resident that is elderly/disabled and in need of assistance, please contact our office to be added to a list so we may offer assistance.

One never knows when you'll need a little neighborly assistance. Unfortunately, less than half of Americans actually know the people in their communities, a fact that becomes all that more acute when it comes to needing cups of sugar or dealing with snowstorm aftermath. Make an effort to get to know your neighbor and assist each other in staying safe.

IS YOUR HOME READY FOR WINTER?


Use this checklist to prepare your home for winter:

Outside

- Have your chimney checked/cleaned
- Inspect the roof for possible leaks / clear debris from flat roof
- Fill low spots around the foundation
- Check weatherstripping around windows & doors
- Clean gutters & downspouts to make sure water is getting moved away from the home
- Check steps & handrails
- · Paint, caulk & seal exterior wood
- Seal masonry and hard surfaces
- Move patio furniture inside or cover to protect
- Check trees for loose/damaged branches
- Check/service snowblower
- Gather shovels/snowbrushes
- STOCK UP ON ICE MELT

Inside

- Change air filters
- Turn off water to exterior water spigot & drain the line
- Test sump pump
- Have your furnace checked/serviced
- Have water heater flushed / pressure release valve checked
- Test vour smoke & carbon monoxide detectors
- Check humidifier / clean drain line
- · Reverse ceiling fans




A Welcome Message from Chief Granitz:

OFFICER SPOTLIGHT: OFFICER ED DELOZIER

At WRPD we want you to know more about the amazing men & women we have working here. We will start with Officer DeLozier, a 21-year veteran, who is a fixture in our community.

Officer DeLozier is a 21-year veteran of the West Reading Police Department working in the patrol division. Officer DeLozier had two transfers to criminal investigations but found working in patrol provides an opportunity to be more proactive and involved in the community.

Officer DeLozier's philosophy is to serve as the protective force for the community and help the community through teamwork and service.

One example of how Officer DeLozier works to bring about change in the community is by serving as the Department's Liaison for the Berks County Juvenile Probation's Youth Aid Panel. Officer DeLozier works with Juvenile Probation and trained community members to offer first-time juvenile offenders a second chance by hearing cases that are referred by the police.

DeLozier feels this process serves two purposes: it prevents kids from becoming more deeply involved in delinquent behavior and makes them accountable to the victim and the community through the completion of panel obligations.

In addition to his role with the Youth Aid Panel, Officer DeLozier is a Controlled Force/Defensive Tactics Instructor, Standardized Field Sobriety Testing Instructor, Handcuffing/ OC Spray/ Police Baton Instructor and CPR/First Aid/AED Instructor.

Officer DeLozier is married with three adult children. His wife Stephanie is the owner of Salon Avanti, located on Penn Avenue. Oldest son Matthew is a recent graduate of Millersville University. Daughter Emily is a Senior at Bloomsburg University,

and youngest son Samuel is a Sophomore at Penn State University.

The DeLozier's make fitness a priority in their lifestyle. Ed and Stephanie compete in marathons and triathlons, as well as staying consistent with high-intensity workouts at Orange Theory in Wyomissing. DeLozier states he feels an obligation to the community he serves and the



officers he serves with to maintain a high level of fitness to meet the demands of police work.

Officer DeLozier is from Ocean City, New Jersey, and moved to Berks County to attend Alvernia University, where he graduated with a degree in Physical Therapy. DeLozier's younger brother began working for the Sea Isle City Police Department, which caused him to contemplate making a career change into law enforcement.

In the fall of 1999, DeLozier decided to leave Physical Therapy and entered the Reading Police Academy. He was hired as a part-time Officer in West Reading in 2000 and became a full-time Officer in 2001. Officer DeLozier is currently attending Alvernia University pursuing a degree in Criminal Justice.

Are you looking for work, need your high school equivalency diploma, or simply need assistance developing your career plan? The Young Adult Program at the PA CareerLink® of Berks County assists 17–24-year-olds living in Berks County with exploring their career and educational paths through counseling, paid work experience, high school equivalency classes, professional development and more! Participants in need of their diploma can enroll in our High School Equivalency Program to obtain their diploma in around 2-4 months, with classes held every weekday. All costs are covered by the program and interested students can also participate in paid work to earn money while attending classes. Participants who have their diploma and are interested in paid work (internships) can earn between \$10-12 an hour working up to 30 hours a week at a variety of worksites. All enrolled participants work with a case manager to develop an in-depth career plan, which includes resume building, financial literacy, and learning valuable job skills. Public Works Department

Keeping West Reading Moving and Open for Business

The Public Works Department provides the daily direction, planning, coordination and supervision of numerous essential public services. Services include street cleaning, snow and ice control, removal of storm debris, storm drain maintenance, street sign maintenance, street construction and maintenance, pool and park system maintenance, leaf removal and water meter maintenance and repairs. All of these services are completed with a crew of nine.

Go Green Program

Did you know that your yard waste can be disposed of at the Borough Garage?

We currently accept grass and hedge clippings, leaves, tree branches and garden waste. Yard waste can be bundled or placed in biodegradable bags. Plastic bags will not be accepted. The Borough Garage is located at 1st & Chestnut Streets. We ask that you please call 610-374-8605 to schedule an appointment between the hours of 7:00 AM to 4:00 PM Monday through Friday or without an appointment on the first Saturday of October and November from 8:00 AM to Noon.

Leaf Collection

The street cleaning program has been a great success! The street cleaning schedule will continue to be used for leaf collection. Please be sure to have your leaves raked out onto the street closest to the curb. Branches and other heavy debris should be separated



from the leaves by placing these types of materials in the planting strip. Branches and large debris will be collected at random times. Please remember to remove your car from a street that is posted for street sweeping to avoid a parking ticket.

Keep a Clear Path to Your Water Meter



Make sure there is a clear path to the remote device for your water meter. Keeping a path clear of lawn furniture, toys, hoses, shrubbery, snow and/or ice, etc. will ensure our road crew personnel can get to your reading device to obtain consistent meter readings.

Sewer Backup

As always, avoid flushing anything other than toilet paper. This means no feminine products/wipes, paper towels, wash cloths, toys, etc. At any time, day or night when a sewer backup occurs at your home or business your first call should be to the Borough. A Public Works Member will plunge the sewer trap located near your home/business in an effort to remove the clog, possibly removing the need to hire a plumber. During normal business hours contact Borough Hall at 610-374-8273 and outside of normal business hours contact the non-emergency Police line at 610-373-0111. A member of the Public Works Department will be dispatched to your location to assess the situation. The Borough maintains the sewer system from the curb to the main. Sewer lines from the house to curb are the property owner's responsibility.

Light Poles

Please report Borough streetlight issues to Borough Hall. Providing the location, address and pole number of the light will help field personnel to make the necessary repairs. If you discover a downed streetlight pole, exposed electrical wires or any other hazardous situation please contact the Police Department at 610-373-0111. To report a streetlight that is either on during the day or not on at night, please contact Borough Hall at 610-374-8273 or you may submit a trouble ticket directly to Met-Ed through their online Report a Lighting Problem portal.

Snow Storm Tips

Snow will be here before you know it! Please prepare your home and family in the event of a large accumulation by keeping emergency lighting on hand, including fresh batteries. Also, know where your water and sewer stacks are to keep them accessible in case of an emergency or backup.

Typically, appointments are made during the annual Reorganization Meeting in January. However, ppointments to fill vacancies occur throughout the year.

PSD-CODE

What is a PSD code? A PSD code stands for Political Subdivision Codes. These are six-digit numbers that identity municipalities (cities, boroughs, townships) in Pennsylvania.

These codes help employers distribute the correct amount of local Earned Income Tax (EIT) to the tax jurisdiction where you live. A PSD code is based on an address. Employers file a Residency Certification File when hiring each employee to determine the correct PSD rate.

Here is what makes up the six digits:

First two digits: These make up the Tax Collection District, usually a county.

This is based on the employee's home address.

First four digits: Combined, the first four digits of a PSD code represent the School District Code, based on the employee's address.

All six digits: Combined, all six digits make up the PSD code, which represents the city, borough, or township where the employee's address is located.

West Reading's PSD code is 061701. Please review your paystubs to ensure that your Earned Income Tax dollars are benefiting you where you reside.

Fire Prevention Week

The week of October 3rd to the 9th is Fire Prevention Week 2021. This year's theme is "Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety. The goal this year is to educate everyone about the different sounds the smoke and carbon monoxide alarms make. Knowing what to do when an alarm sounds will keep you and your family safe. When an alarm makes noises – a beeping sound or a chirping sound – you must take action.

Open House

We will be holding an Open House at the station on October 17th starting at 11:00am and running until 2:00pm. We will have fire prevention displays for the entire family, refreshments, and our fire apparatus and station open for tours. Please plan on stopping by and enjoy the afternoon with your local firefighters!

Smoke Detectors

Please call the station if you have questions about smoke alarms or if you need your batteries changed and are unable to do so yourself. We also have new smoke alarms for sale at a cost of \$10 each installed. Just call or email for more information!

Fire Safety

We are now approaching the peak heating season, so it is important to keep some safety tips in mind. Make sure that you have a functioning Carbon Monoxide detector in your residence. Remember to keep all curtains or other combustible materials away from space heaters, and also be careful to keep children away because just bumping a heater while playing could cause a fire. Also remember that natural Christmas trees can be a hazard if not properly cared for. Please remember to keep the water bowl in the stand full at all times and use only lights that are UL approved for indoor use and have been checked for any problems before they have been installed on the tree.

The mission of the West Reading Recreation Commission is to provide excellence in the delivery of programs, events and services. The Borough's 23-acre park is for the use of West Reading residents and their guests. The Park facilities includes a stone pavilion, walking trails, pickleball and basketball courts, baseball and softball fields, a gravel track, volleyball court, community swimming pool and a disc golf course with a double tee pad to make it an 18-hole course.

The Bicentennial House was introduced back in 1976 by Elta K. Bitz. The Bicentennial House is available for small parties, gatherings, meetings and special events. The building has a gathering room with a full kitchen and handicapped accessible restrooms. There is also green landscape for outdoor entertainment.

Household Hazardous Waste Disposal

Looking for a responsible way to dispose of unwanted paints, cleaners, oils, batteries and pesticides at no cost to you? The Berks County Ag Center, located at 1238 County Welfare Road will be hosting a hazardous waste disposal event on Saturday, October 23rd from 8am to 2pm rain or shine. This event is free to all Berks County residents, pre-registration



is required. Please visit www.co.berks.pa.us/swa to register. Household hazardous waste is any household product that is labeled: caution, danger, flammable, explosive, toxic, warning, corrosive, poison, volatile or any combination of these characteristics. Placing these items in the trash or down the drain contributes to the pollution of our air and drinking waters.

When is Bulk Trash Pickup?

On the first Friday of every month, each household may place one bulk item at the curb for collection with your weekly trash. Bulk items may weigh no more than 75 pounds nor exceed five-feet in length. Items such as tires, appliances, water heaters, batteries, items with Freon, etc. will not be accepted. These items must be recycled at a recycling center. For more information, please contact the Berks County Solid Waste Authority at 610-478-6362 or visit their website at www.co.berks.pa.us/swa.



These items are accepted for a specific reason, they can be recycled and made into new products. Unfortunately, either by accident or misunderstanding, unacceptable items continue to be placed in recycling containers. Do not place items out for collection that are larger than what will fit into a sorting machine. For more information as to why these items are accepted or not accepted, please visit the Borough website and search for "What to Recycle".

Car batteries, and any other type of large, lead-acid batteries cannot go into your household trash or recycling. You can look up where to dispose of car and other lead-acid batteries on Earth911 or visit any automotive parts store. Likewise, **rechargeable** batteries must be taken to a collection site that can be found on Earth911 or visit the Berks County Solid Waste Authority Electronic Recycling Center. Regular AA, AAA, or other letter-named batteries are now safer to throw directly into the trash, but they can also be recycled into different things such as cement or new batteries. No matter what you decide to do with your regular batteries, make sure to tape the ends since they could have a little spark left and could start a fire if they come into contact with other batteries.

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
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
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
